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Hearing Health Care is Routine Health Care

Most people are accustomed to making regular checkups a routine part of their medical care. Annual physicals, dental exams and vision tests are all commonplace. **However, fewer individuals pay as much attention to their hearing**. It's not that they intentionally neglect their hearing; many are simply unaware of how often they should get their hearing tested, and the number of physicians recommending routine hearing evaluations is small.

How often you get your hearing tested depends on your age. Newborn hearing screenings are essential, of course, and regular checkups throughout childhood are commonplace. But few adults give their hearing much thought unless they are experiencing a noticeable loss in hearing ability. By then, their options for treatment may be more limited. The American Speech-Language-Hearing Association's (ASHA) guidelines state that healthy adults aged 18-40 who are not experiencing any noticeable hearing loss should have their hearing tested every three to five years. More frequent hearing tests are recommended for any of the following individuals:

People over the age of 40. As we age, cumulative damage to the hair cells in the inner ear becomes more prevalent, affecting the ability to understand high frequencies. Annual hearing tests are recommended for all adults beginning at the age of 40, regardless of whether or not they are experiencing symptoms.

People who are exposed to loud noises. Noise-induced hearing loss affects individuals of all ages. Those who are frequently exposed to loud noises have a higher risk of suffering permanent damage to their hearing. People who work in noisy environments or regularly participate in noisy activities should have their hearing checked once a year.

People with hearing loss. Even if you have been diagnosed with hearing loss and wear hearing aids, it's more important than ever to have your hearing tested on a regular basis. Because hearing continues to change over time, it's important that your treatment is as up-do-date as possible to ensure you are receiving the maximum benefit. 






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Bet On Sound Beginnings

Explore your Surroundings with Communication by SLP Jessica Bosley

After an unpredictable and long winter, spring is finally here! A new season gives us ample opportunities to explore our surroundings with communication. In the morning start by discussing the day's weather- is it wet, cold, dreary, hot, windy? How does it feel? What does it look like? What sounds do you hear? As you are getting your child dressed, relate the clothing back to the weather. Categories help us determine what clothes are associated with certain weather conditions.



Music makes addressing language fun and engaging, and science tells us that music has a positive effect on the development of a child's brain. There are many songs about the weather. What's the Weather Like Today? It's Raining It's Pouring, I Can Sing a Rainbow, Rain, Rain Go Away, Itsy Bitsy Spider, If All The Raindrops, Mr. Sun, It's a Beautiful Day, You Are My Sunshine, Weather Song for Children. These songs are versatile and accessible, and many have gestures or movements that will help your child work on following directions as well.

Tiny Tots Talking Intervention Program

In late 2022, thanks to a grant from Copia Foundation, The Hearing & Speech Center implemented a pilot program, "Tiny Tots Talking Intervention Program". This program, led by Shelby Rutledge HSC's Speech/Language Therapy Program Director, primarily works with children ages 0 to 2 years, developing a foundation for early literacy skills. Every week, Ms. Shelby dedicates time in seven classrooms (infant, toddler and early preschool) providing activities that stimulate and increase auditory pathways of the brain for children with and without hearing loss to provide the foundation for literacy and school readiness skills.



Shelby uses lots of singing, repetition of sounds and words, focusing on first 100 words for children 0-18 months



and then the next 150-300 words for 18-36 months. **Ultimately, the earlier young children are exposed to and use oral vocabulary, the greater their literacy success.** By the time a child reaches kindergarten, this can mean the difference between being on track to succeed or falling behind academically. Language provides the foundation for the development of literacy skills.
